This term there will be a prize for the most original project and a prize for the most informational project

Select from the following list.

- Research and design your own Crusade shield pattern
- Create a model of a weapon used in the Crusades or English Civil war such as: a mace, trebuchet, lance or the matchlock (for ideas and information use the following websites: <http://crusadesproject.weebly.com/weapons.html> or <https://prezi.com/euxelcd7dtd9/weapons-used-in-the-english-civil-war/>)
- Research another conflict and present the information in an interesting way. Some conflicts to research:

- Write a story about being in war
- Write a setting description of a battle scene from a film (example Avengers: Infinity War battle in Wakanda.)
- Draw and label the uniform of the Roundheads and Cavaliers (English Civil War)- you will need to research this
- Write a poem about your feelings about conflict
- Create a comic strip depicting the Crusades or the English Civil War

As there is a large amount of information about the topics I have included suggested websites to assist with the home learning.

Please note this project is on top of the expected homework for year 5 which is as follows: Daily reading for 20 minutes and daily practice of times tables. Additional challenges based on learning in school may also be sent home.
