## Important Vocabulary I Will Learn and Use

<b>Monarchy</b>	A form of government that has a single person (known as a monarch) at its head.	
<b>Royal</b>	Is connected to the monarch or their family.	
<b>Henry VIII</b>	A king of England—famous for having 6 wives and starting the protestant religion in England.	
<b>Source</b>	A place of information, can be primary or secondary.	
<b>Propaganda</b>	Information that is used to make the public feel a particular way.	
<b>Tyrant</b>	A ruler who governs with unfairness and cruelty. They have absolute power.	
<b>Inventory</b>	A list of items that detail what is in a place. Can be used for tax purposes.	
<b>Royal progress</b>	The monarch visits a town with all of their staff. The town has to cater for the visit.
